Date	Event
701 BCE	King Sennacherib of Assyria sieged you <sup>1</sup>
597 BCE	Nebuchadnezzar II of Babylon besieged you and your King Yehoyakin was taken <sup>2</sup>
586 BCE	After a two year siege <sup>3</sup> your citizens starved and you finally fell to Nebuchadnezzar II and the Babylonians. <sup>4</sup> You people were carried off to a foreign land and you lamented: אֵיכָה יִשְׁבָּה בְּדָד, הָעִיר רַבְתִּי עַם --הֵיטָה, כְּאַלְמָנָה "How lonely sits the city that was full of people." <sup>5</sup>
539 BCE	King Cyrus and the Persians <sup>6</sup> take you
322- BCE	Alexander the Great and the Greeks ravage you
63 BCE	Pompey and the Romans brought you to tears.
638 CE	Imur Ibn al Khattab and Islam take you
1099-1187 CE	The Christians conquer you

<b>1187 CE</b>	At battle of Hattin Saladin conquers you. You were in the hands of the Ottoman Empire from 1516-1917
<b>1917 CE</b>	The English rule over you
<b>1948 CE</b>	The European Jews take you over

Jerusalem, you wondered are there any sorrows like yours? True, you have experienced tremendous suffering and unthinkable sorrow.
